Conference Theme

Since the beginning of its reform and “opening up” in 1978, China has undergone urbanization at a scale and speed that is unprecedented in history, and Chinese cities have grown to a massive scale. On December 20, 2015, the Chinese government held the Central Urban Work Conference for the first time in 37 years. The conference called for the transformation of urban development in China by improving the structure and capacity of urban governance systems to solve problems that plague cities. The goals of these changes are to create harmonious, livable, energetic, and modern cities, to improve the quality of urbanization in the future, and to establish a path for development with Chinese characteristics. This conference represents a new era for Chinese top-down urban planning, where cities will focus on the quality and content of development rather than simply pursuing large-scale, fast growth. Urban planning will emphasize people and their environment, with how “places” shape “people” and “their lives” becoming increasingly important. “Putting people first” has once again become the central goal of urban planning. At the same time, urban “spaces” are large, complex systems composed of interrelated factors like economics, society, the environment, urban management, and culture; as such, urban environments have become a major focus of study for a wide variety of academic disciplines. Therefore, the central topic of the new era of urban planning lies in how urban spaces adapt to the needs of the many groups of people who live in cities, thereby facilitating social fairness and sustainable development.

The theme for this conference is “Activating Space: Returning to Human-Centered Urban Planning and Design.” During this new historical period, we will once again consider the meaning and value of urban spaces, the connotations of urban spaces, the ways that urban spaces sustain urban lifestyles, and other aspects of urban life such as politics, economics, society, the environment, city management, culture, and technology. This annual conference will bring together scholars, governmental managers, and planning practitioners from around the world for a meaningful dialogue on ways to address urban problems, to improve the natural environment, and to increase the quality of life in cities.
